FOUR IMMORTAL CHAPLAINS

Maybe you know the story of the Four Immortal Chaplains. It was during WWII on February 3, 1942, when US Army transport ship "Dorchester" was sunk by the Germans in the icy Atlantic waters near Greenland. There were not enough life vests for all on board, so these four Chaplains each gave up their own to save lives of others. They were last seen by survivors linking arms and singing hymns as the ship sank into the sea.

What made these Chaplains and their story immortal was their cooperation and sacrifice. George Fox was a Methodist, Alexander Goode was a Rabbi, Clark Poling was Dutch Reformed, and John Washington was a Catholic Priest. Yet in service to their country in a time of immediate crisis, they gave no second thought as to what needed to be done. They willingly joined together to save others' lives.

They are a true example of heroism, selfless service, sacrifice, humility, cooperation, and focus on the higher calling. They are remembered in February every year. Their story is legend.

At a time in 2024 when our nation seems more divided than ever, these Four Immortal Chaplains remind us what duty to God and Country looks like. It means to keep the important things the

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priority, especially the eternal things. It means to find the way towards cooperation. When our goal is to serve others with our very best, it gives us opportunity for cooperation. Rather than sorting people according to religious beliefs or political views, as Legionnaires we can join together to serve others with our very best. I believe that my oath to serve God and Country never expires. Legionnaire of the Quarter



William "Bill" Jenison was born in 1938 at home in Langley, SC. His mother was a stay-at-home mom and his father worked in a local cotton mill. Their upbringing and guidance, along with his sister and brother, were instrumental in how he lived his life and any accomplishments achieved.

When Bill finished LBC High School in 1956, he was accepted at Georgia Tech for an engineering degree and ROTC. After a year at Tech he transferred to Clemson and graduated with a BS in Industrial Engineering and a 2nd Lt rank in the Army.

His first Army assignment included support to military families in Bad Kreuznach, Germany in the early 1960s. Later assignments were in Vietnam

during the war in 1967-1969 that included POL support to US II Corps during the first tour and as the US POL advisor to the South Vietnamese Army during the second tour. From there, assignments included duty in the Pentagon as the Army POL staff officer and in the Netherlands as the Allied Forces Central Europe (AFCENT) POL staff officer. While on active duty, he completed an MS degree at Virginia Tech.

After retiring from the Army in 1983 as Lt Col, he worked for the Navy as a DoD civilian for about 15 years. This position was support to NAVAIR program managers with cost and schedule management in the development of fighter aircraft. While at NAVAIR he completed an MS degree from the University of Southern California. Subsequently, he worked for NASA supporting schedule management in the development of the James Webb Space Telescope (JSWT), which was to explore space beyond any capabilities available at that time.

The Department is holding another Veteran Experience Action Center (VEAC) March 21-23, 2024 at South Carolina National Guard, 1328 Old Dairy Dr, Columbia, SC.

March 21, 0900-1500 (Thursday) March 22, 0900-1500 (Friday) March 23, 0900-1400 (Saturday)

The VEAC is a great opportunity for eligible veterans and their dependents to be assisted by a team that includes Veteran's Organization Service Officers, Department of Veterans Affairs Benefit Officials and Healthcare Representatives. These representatives can help facilitate and *expedite* your new or existing VA disability claims, appeals, or other healthcare problems. You must come prepared with the proper documentation about your case: DD214, all medical records about your disability both military and civilian.

Transfer to Post Everlasting

★ Thurmond Burnett passed away on Friday February 2, 2024 at the age of 85. Thurmond devoted his life to the duty of tending to the needs of his community. He was the owner of the Edgefield Mercantile Funeral Home and Jennie's Flower Shop and served as the county coroner. For a span of 66 years, he stood as a pillar of support for the residents of Edgefield County, navigating them through their most trying moments. In April 2018, Thurmond was honored with the Order of the Palmetto by Governor Henry McMaster which is the highest honor given to a civilian in the state of South Carolina for his many contributions to Edgefield County and a 47year position that made him the longest serving Coroner in South Carolina. He attended Edgefield First Baptist Church and was a lifelong member of Post 30.

1st Vietnam War Medal Of Honor Winner Dies Jan. 25th

Col. Roger Donlon, U.S. Army, Ret., age 89, the first Medal of Honor Vietnam War recipient, died Jan. 25th, 2024, in Kansas. Wounded four times,

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then captain Donlon distinguished himself in combat as a Green Beret in 1964. "*Beyond Nam Bong*" (1968) is his story. Sixty four recipients are still living: Congressional MOH Society.

Legionnaires may recall the Budweiser marketing campaign beginning in 1979 that touted "This Bud's For You." The message went on to say "There is no one who does it quite the way you do. So here's to you, you know is isn't only what you say, it's what you do."

One Bud that mirrored that cliché was Col. George Everette "Bud" Day who as a youth in 1942 dropped out of high school to enlist in the USMC. He later served in the Army reserve, Iowa Air National Guard, and the USAF, spanning WWII, the Korean conflict, and Vietnam War. He was to become the nation's most highly decorated military officer since Gen. Douglas MacArthur, and the only aviator to be awarded both the Medal of Honor and the Air Force Cross.

In 1967 on his 65th mission into North Vietnam he was shot down and captured by enemy militia, only to escape and evade for fifteen days until captured again by Viet Cong. He was imprisoned for five years and seven months. John McCain, future senator and presidential candidate was his cell mate. A repatriated Day spent over a year regaining his health and with many waivers eventually returned to flight status. He retired in 1977. During his military career, Day would complete college and graduate school, receiving masters, JD and PhD degrees. After retirement he returned to practicing law, becoming a staunch advocate of military retirees. He sued the US government over promised free lifetime medical care. As result of his effort, Congress would later pass the Tricare for Life medical benefit enjoyed today.

John McCain said of Day's death in 2013, "He was the bravest man I ever knew, and his fierce resistance and resolute leadership set the example for us in prison of how to return home with honor."

Bud Day was later posthumously advanced to brigadier general. He authored *Return With Honor*, and *Duty*, *Honor*, *Country* that updated his life story after his USAF career.
