John W. "Pete" Peterson, Sr. Legionnaire of the Quarter



Pete's military career began with enlistment in the Air Force Reserve as a one-stripe airman third class while attending the University of Miami. He retired as a lieutenant colonel command pilot and instructor 26 years later with over 5,300 flight hours, a Distinguished Flying Cross, nine Air Medals, combat tour in Vietnam, and the same number of landings as takeoffs. He also survived staff jobs at a major Air Force command headquarters, executive officer at wing and group levels, and director of a seven-state public affairs program. His assignments permitted attainment of graduate degrees at Southern Illinois and Auburn Universities, and study at the University of Oklahoma. He is a graduate of the Air War College, Class of '77.

He next became research and planning manager for the Arizona Department of Public Safety, graduating from the police academy as a reserve Arizona State Trooper. When not directing a professional civilian administrative staff, Trooper Pete might have been found "meeting and greeting" motorists and truckers on Arizona highways. A best of two worlds.

Retiring again, he and wife of 27 years Sandy directed a very large full-time senior adult ministry for five years at their community church. He has been a champion of foster children in Arizona, serving 14 years on a board reviewing their care, four years as state chairman. The Arizona Supreme Court further appointed him as a commissioner for the review of judicial performance.

Pete began writing essays on Americanism in the sixth grade. Subsequent writings have included Congressional testimony. He contributes a lot of time researching, finding photos and artwork, and writing articles for the Hezzie Gazette as "correspondent at large." "I love to creatively focus attention to items of interest to Post 30 members," he says. "And, adding a little subtle humor helps make the stories come alive," he adds. *American Legion Post 30 Newsletter*

In Memory of Hezzie Griffis



On this Memorial Day, let us pause to remember PVT Hezzie Franklin Griffis, for whom Post 30 is named, who died 107 years ago serving in World War I in France.

Hezzie died on October 30, 1918, in a French hospital. Nearly three years later, his body was exhumed, returned to Edgefield, and proudly escorted by members of Post 30 for reburial at Berea Baptist Church.

Inscription on his tombstone:

Hero of the World War It was hard to give thee up, But Thy will, O God, be done.

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My Most Memorable Memorial Day

Around Memorial Day 22 years ago I visited Flanders, Belgium to pay respects to my uncle Thomas McCann, a WWI British soldier who is buried there. His military life was much like that of Post 30 namesake Hezzie Griffis. Both were soldiers of equivalent rank, in their early twenties, allies in the same conflict, and both mortally wounded in France, each suffering loss of a leg.



Thomas enlisted in the British army at age 18. He shipped to France in 1914 as a gunner with the Royal Garrison Artillery. His 75-man unit manned heavy, large caliber guns and powerful howitzer cannons. They were positioned in trenches along the Western Front near Ypres [ee-pruh, often called "Wipers" by soldiers], Belgium. Gunner Tommy and his comrades were digging often flooded trenches, interrupted by constant shelling, machine gun fire and seeping water. A German "whizz bang" struck their trench. A "whizz bang" was an inbound shell traveling faster than the speed of sound and you would hear the "whizz" noise before the cannon's "bang". Tommy was mortally wounded and evacuated to a medical unit where he died on September 22, 1915. He was buried at the Lijssenthoek [Li-sen-thock] military cemetery near Poperinge, in western Belgium. I felt moved to make the once-in-alifetime trip.



Arriving in Poperinge by train from Brussels 85 miles away and riding a rented bicycle through fields of poppies was the only way to visit his Lijssenthoek gravesite. Soldiers who died were buried there in long trenches as evidenced by tombstone edges just inches from one another. Lijssenthoek was a somber, beautiful yet fitting place for Uncle Tommy, a soldier of war, to spend eternity. I couldn't have experienced a better Memorial Day.

Chaplain's Corner WARFIGHTER ADVANCE REPORT

Thank you for the continued opportunity to be your Chaplain for Post 30. I love serving the post, the community and the Legion.

Last month I attended a week-long event for Veterans called Warfighter Advance. Warfighter Advance is a program for Veterans that has been in existence for 10 years. It is a life-changing educational, team building, and resilience program for Veterans of all ages, all eras, and all US military branches. The program is totally FREE, to include air fare if the attendee needs it!

Warfighter Advance takes place three times each spring and three times each fall and is located at a rustic camp in eastern Maryland near Baltimore. All meals, lodging, and program materials are provided. Participants even get a free fleece jacket, two polo shirts, and two t-shirts with their names embroidered. The focus of the week is on learning to cope with past military experiences and not accept labels such as "depression," "anxiety" or PTSD. The program is created by Dr. Mary Vieten, a retired Navy Clinical Psychologist. Her extensive research and practice show that these feelings are normal reactions to abnormal experiences in one's military career. They teach healthy ways of re-entering civilian life such as outdoor activity, healthy eating and sleeping, meditation, and exercise.

If you or some Veteran you know might be interested, and you have week to spare, visit the website <u>www.warfighteradvance.org</u> to learn more and to sign up for the week of your choice. Let them know on the form that Chaplain Beaver referred you.

Falling Dominoes Leading to Victory in Europe Day

"The V for Victory sign is the symbol of the unconquerable will of the occupied territories, and a portent of the fate awaiting the Nazi tyranny." -- Winston Churchill

May 8 marks the 80th anniversary of the end of the second world war in Europe. It was a time of great jubilation. Spontaneous celebrations erupted around the world. It was also President Harry S. Truman's 61st birthday as he announced by radio of Nazi Germany's unconditional surrender. Looking back, there were many falling dominoes, so to speak, in a series of events that led to the crumbling of the Third Reich.



The invasion of Poland in 1939 was doomed for eventual failure. Many dominoes tumbled. By April 1945, Allied defenders had captured 1,500,000 German prisoners of war (POWs) on the Western Front. Some 120,000 combatants were taken prisoner in Italy. Another 800,000 plus surrendered on the Eastern Front. And on May 2nd, nearly 1,000,000 soldiers in Italy and Austria surrendered. Another 1,000,000 German land, sea and air force members in Northwest Germany, Denmark and the Netherlands surrendered on May 4th. Camps were established for hundreds of thousands of "Disarmed Enemy Forces," avoiding the legalese "POW" of the 1929 Geneva Convention outlining treatment of former combatants. German troops also withdrew from Finland. The Axis leadership was decimated too. Benito Mussolini was executed by Italian partisans. Germany's Joseph Goebbels and Adolph Hitler both committed suicide. And up to 10,000 Nazi war criminals and fascists fled Europe. More dominoes down!

Ending the war was not like turning off a light switch. Although two unconditional surrender documents had been signed by May 8, 1945, not all German commanders obeyed orders from their high command to surrender. Some surrenders wouldn't take place in parts of Poland, Greece, France, Czechoslovakia, and Yugoslavia until later in May, and in the Netherlands on June 11.

National Military Appreciation Month Bursts at the Seams

May is perhaps the busiest month of the year for significant United States military observances, but we'll help navigate you through. National Military Appreciation Month was established by Congress back in 1999 to honor and thank U.S. service members. May was picked as it already included Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, and Military Spouse Appreciation Day. They complement National Veterans and Military Families Month in November, and April's Month of the Military Child. Here's May's readily identifiable observances for 2025:

- May 1st Silver Star Banner Day, a non-federal recognition of those awarded the Silver Star
- May 8th Victory in Europe Day (V-E Day) 1945
- May 9th Military Spouse Appreciation Day
- May 13th Children of Fallen Patriots Day, established in 2014 by a non-profit to honor children who lost a parent who served in the military
- May 17th Armed Forces Day, thanking members from all U.S. military services comes during Armed Forces Week, May 12 through May 17
- May 26th Memorial Day

Armed Forces Day and Memorial Day are two of the three major military holidays, and with Veterans Day on Nov. 11 give Americans an opportunity to thank current service members, veterans, and honor those who have paid the ultimate price in service to the nation. As the holidays draw near, we distinguish that Armed Forces Day gives gratitude to those currently serving and who have served, Veterans Day to those who have hung up their uniform, and Memorial Day to honor the fallen.
