A Busy Spring Ahead at Post 30

While the typical South Carolina winter temperatures may have kept some members from attending our February meeting, it didn't slow us down. We started the year strong and are now diving into a busy spring with exciting events planned for March and April.

March Events

Our March meeting will kick off with a special visit from Jelani Edwards of the South Carolina Department of Veterans Affairs (SCDVA). He'll host a workshop to explore the Palmetto Pathfinder Program and its support for veterans and transitioning servicemembers. We've invited soldiers from the South Carolina Army National Guard 122nd Engineer Battalion, along with members of Post 154, Post 222, and VFW Post 6932, to join us.

We're also looking to schedule a day in March to visit the veteran patients at Edgefield Post Acute Rehabilitation and Nursing Home. The veterans always love having us there, and the staff makes it a smooth visit.

April Events

April is Children and Youth Month for The American Legion, and we have several events planned to celebrate young people while connecting with veterans and the community. We'll start with a fundraiser at the Merriwether Spring Fling on Sunday, April 6, from 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM at Patriots Smokehouse, 2006 Martintown Road. We'll be selling rifle raffle tickets, handing out free popcorn for kids, chatting with folks in the community, and talking with veterans about the benefits of becoming an American Legion member.

We're also reaching out to the five elementary schools in the county to schedule visits where we'll read to students and give each child an American Legion comic book, coloring book, and crayons, all packaged in a blue Post 30 cloth bag. Both of these events are great ways to support local schools, spread awareness about the Legion, and connect with families.

In addition, we're coordinating with the Strom Thurmond ROTC to schedule a flag disposal ceremony in April, offering a respectful and dignified way to properly retire a worn United States flag.

Paris in Springtime Births The American Legion

On March 19, 2025, The American Legion celebrates its 106th birthday, founded by war-weary American Expeditionary Forces in Paris, France in 1919 as they awaited repatriation following WWI. Legion Americanism, national influence and accomplishment would become preeminent among U. S. military veteran organizations in the following century. Best accounts of Legion beginnings can be found in the *Stars and Stripes* newspaper published in France 1918 to 1919, and the centennial article *It All Began in Paris A Century Ago* by Legion writer Jeff Stoffer.

By March 15, 1919, a caucus of U.S. Army officer and enlisted delegates representing 35 Army divisions and a small contingent of marines, convened a three-day session in Paris. Among distinguished contributors were LTC Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., son of a former U.S. president, and participant, legendary Medal of Honor recipient Army Sergeant Alvin York. The U.S. Navy, busy redeploying soldiers stateside, was not at first represented until late on the last day, when a lone sailor drifted in. Asked whom he represented. "Hell" he reportedly replied, "I don't represent anybody. I thought there was a show going on here." Apparently, anyone who happened to wander by could sit down and take part.

It was reportedly bit of a madhouse. Amid the chaos, the assembly adopted a constitution, appointed an executive committee and four standing committees to establish a fledgling American Legion. Finally, the hat was passed to collect 4,000 francs to cover caucus expenses. Today, 106 years later, the Legion is over a million and-a-half strong, with more than 21,000 members in South Carolina alone. And it all started in Paris, France, for God and country.

In addition to her work in the classroom, Sarah has been an active member of her community, serving as a leader in various organizations, including the North Augusta Mother's Club and Grace United Methodist Church. Her contributions to local initiatives like Real Men Read, which connects community leaders with students, and providing resources to underprivileged students have made her an invaluable asset to the community. Sarah's passion for education, coupled with her dedication to making a difference, truly exemplifies the spirit of an outstanding teacher.

Legionnaire of the Quarter Howell N. "Sam" Watson, Jr.



Sam Watson, 85, a 28-year American Legion member is being honored by the post as Legionnaire of the Quarter for January - March 2025. He had been the commander of Post 30 in 2001. At that time. Post 30 had 107 members. The Mullins, South Carolina native and 1961 Citadel graduate completed 23 years in the Air Force and retired in 1983 as a lieutenant colonel. His military career took him all over the world to major Air Force assignments with the Tactical Air Command, 7th Air Force, Air Force headquarters, and European and Pacific commands. He served in-country during the Vietnam War receiving the Bronze Star medal that added to a slew of meritorious service and commendation awards throughout his career. Upon leaving the service, he became a vice president of Science Applications International Corporation, a Fortune 500 information technology company in Virginia.

Sam and wife Mary have been residents of Edgefield for the past 30 years. Here, he has championed community service as Edgefield Lions Club president, in various Masonic lodge posts, a Wardlaw school teacher and board member, and a Piedmont Technical College board member. He was Edgefield County's 2015 Citizen of the Year, among Who's Who in American Teachers, and is an active member of the Edgefield Methodist Church.

Today, Sam lives a more modest life farming pine trees for pulp and wood products. Post 30 members congratulate you, Sam, on a distinguished military career and many contributions to your post and community.

Just because we see a person has grown old, it might be easy to think of them as less valuable than younger folks. But how we miss out on the true value of those older folks and the wisdom and resilience they provide!

On April 1, 2025, the TRICARE Online Patient Portal (TOL PP) will be decommissioned. To ensure uninterrupted access to your health information, please log in to your TOL PP account and download or print your historical health records before the portal is closed.

The MHS GENESIS Patient Portal has replaced TOL PP and allows you to access your electronic health records 24/7.

Why is this important?

Your TOL PP health records won't transfer to MHS GENESIS once TOL PP is decommissioned.

We Are Not Invisible – The Face of Women Veterans

Here are some insightful facts about women veterans nationally, in South Carolina, and among American Legion membership, drawn from information compiled by the National Association for Veterans Analysis and Statistics (NAVAS), the U. S. Veterans Administration (VA), Department of Labor (DOL), and The American Legion (TAL):



- "There are nearly two million living women veterans in the United States. Women currently make up approximately 10% of the overall veteran population. Veterans make up 14% of the men in America, but among all women in America, only 1.5% are veterans." (DOL: July 2024)
- There are about 46,000 female veterans in South Carolina representing about 12% and will continue to grow by 1% yearly for the next three years. (NAVAS)
- In order to find one woman veteran, you may have to meet 69 women. (TAL)
- The median age of women veterans is 51 years, compared to men 65 years, a 14-year difference. (TAL)
- The American Legion membership is now 1.3 million nationally not differentiated by gender. There were 3.12 million members just 14 years ago. However, the Legion counts more than 5,000 female veterans in its Auxiliary. (TAL)
- In 2017, a woman Army veteran, Denise Rohan of Wisconsin, became the first American Legion National Commander. (TAL)

- Currently, there are four all-women veteran American Legion posts out of over 14,000: two in Wisconsin, one in Ohio, and one on the Oglala Sioux Indian Reservation in South Dakota. This is down from ten that existed in Ohio following WWII. (TAL)
- American Legion Post 30 in Edgefield, South Carolina, is fortunate to have three very visible women members: our Post Adjutant Jane Doolittle, Post Historian Suzy Spurgeon, and Micki Pennington. Thank you, ladies.

A Salute to Our Vietnam War Veterans

March 29 is s National Vietnam War Veterans Day. It's a time to pay special tribute to those who served during the Vietnam War era, to those 58,000 whose names are memorialized on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., and those who never received the recognition they deserved when they returned to America from war.

The Vietnam War was the nation's longest and costliest conflict of the so-called Cold War, fought from about 1961 through the fall of Saigon in April 1975. It had no conventional front lines. What began as a small U.S. program to train the South Vietnamese army in 1961 grew into a massive military effort to combat communist insurgents like Viet Cong, North Vietnamese, Cambodians and Laotians. Over the course of the war, U.S. Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard assisted South Vietnamese forces, located and destroyed North Vietnamese troops and supply routes, conducted ground operations, patrolled rivers and canals, and mined North Vietnamese ports. Combat and combat support missions also operated from Thailand, Philippines, B-52 bombers flew from Guam, and Naval forces deployed to the South China Sea and Gulf of Tonkin. The combat and combat support areas were extremely large, as depicted on the map below.



According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, from 1964 to 1973 more than 3.4 million Americans were deployed to Southeast Asia, with approximately 2.7 million of them serving in the Republic of Vietnam.
